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CAA Board meeting highlights

On Sunday afternoon, the boards of both the Canadian Angus Foundation and Canadian Angus Association participated in a joint session to discuss the future direction and strategic plans of the Canadian Angus Foundation. The Foundation has grown immensely over the last few years and both boards look forward to the Foundation's continued evolution and growth. The Canadian Angus Board supports its Foundation Board to collaboratively work over the next few years to determine just how far our Foundation can go and what they can do. For our Foundation, the Canadian Angus Board believes the proverbial "sky is the limit" and the Foundation Board knows they have the support of their 'parent' to 'dream' to where their 'vision' lands, then work toward it.

The Board spent a significant amount of time discussing the future direction of the Canadian Angus Association and ways to ensure the Association remains at the forefront of Canada's beef industry. Members can look forward to hearing about specific initiatives over the next several months.

As part of their future planning, President David posed a question at Convention: "If you could change one thing about your program or this Association, what would it be?" Directors have been asking members this question throughout the summer and will continue to ask through the busy fall season. Members are encouraged to answer this question by speaking to a director or by emailing president@cdnangus.ca.

The Canadian Angus Association is going to modify our existing online events calendar <http://cdnangus.ca/activities-and-services/calendar-of-events> to include the names of CAA staff and directors that will be in attendance at events. We encourage all members to submit their sales and on-farm events. There is no charge for event listings.

At the annual general meeting, a member made a Recommendation from the Floor that the Board consider adjusting the length of the President's term from one year to two. The Board discussed the recommendation but determined that they support the current one-year commitment from the President, supported by the roles of Past President and President Elect.

At the urging of Animal Registration Officer David Trus, the Board discussed breeding goals for the Angus breed. Mr. Trus suggested that all breed associations should have defined, determined breeding goals. The purpose of defining breeding goals is to identify values, help market the Angus breed, update the member value proposition, etc. The Board will continue to work on the measurable Canadian Angus 'breeding goals' for the next two meetings.

Following up on discussions held during Convention, the Board discussed various ways of rotating

Convention across the country. They decided to uphold the current rotation which will see Convention hosted according to the following schedule:



A Note from Breed Development

Submitting Performance Data with Correct Management Groups:

Individual performance data like birth, weaning, yearling weights, ultrasound scan information, even calving ease information and scrotal circumference isn't really very valuable without correct management group information. Why? Because predictions of genetic merit (an animal's value as breeding stock or EPDs) are not calculated using the actual weight, but the difference in an animal's individual weight compared with its contemporary group. Contemporary groups are made by grouping like animals of the same sex and age from the same herd together in the same management group. The key here is that members only put animals that were managed and raised together in the same management group.

Your Association recommends that you place all your calves in one group if they were all raised in one pasture and given the same opportunity to develop whatever trait you are reporting on; at this time of year it's normally weaning weight. Put all the calves that had the same feeding and growing opportunity and environment in one group. If you had your calves in two different pastures with different types of grass, different access to water, different terrain to walk through, then place the calves in two different groups. If you had calves that you fed extra or that got sick, please place those in different management groups.

Some myths:

- Do not place calves from different sires in different management groups
- Do not place bull calves and heifer calves in different management groups--we'll do that for you
- Do not place your best animals in one group and your bottom performing animals in another group--if they were raised together they get grouped together
- Manage your calves according to your grass, your land, your resources and when you submit your

performance information, maintain the calves in those groups--you'll get the best (most accurate) EPDs back in return

to develop genetics through their offspring, in our new ACE program. You will no longer pay for each registration, transfer, parentage verification or weight submission, nor will you pay a membership fee or purchase your RFID tag for cows within your Active Herd Inventory. All of these products and services will be automatically provided to you at the time of your request.

We know that this value in 2015 for each calf registered is \$75. Because ACE is based on cows enrolled and not annual registered calves, and not everyone registers every calf, the fee per cow will be lower. The CAA Board is taking these next few months for a consultative process to ensure the final ACE fee provides exactly the value you receive and nothing more.

ACE is a 'revenue neutral' program. It is designed to

The Mystery of the Unresolved Insurance Claim

It's May 20th and I am driving through the pasture when I come across one of my worst nightmares....

My most expensive bull is laying belly up right in front of me. "What happened? It's the middle of breeding season, I need that bull!! Wait, did I get insurance? Will I be able to replace this bull?" There are so many questions whizzing around my head as I think about what will happen now that the bull is dead.

match our last year's activity level and not exceed it. ACE is not about changing fees... it's about changing our focus and the way we do business.

One. Annual. Fee. Per. Cow.

You will know by the first of January every year what your entire years' worth of CAA activity will be. No new fees: not Transaction, not CAPP Membership, not name change. One annual fee. Assessed as of January 1st.

We are all about The Angus Cow. In one form or another, your Board has been talking about this program for years; now is the time to do it. Angus is #1 in Canada: what keeps us there is The Angus Cow.

In changing the way we do business through ACE, your CAA knows this is what will

is dead.

As I sit there the whole story of this bull starts rushing back to me.

This bull was the one to have at the sale; he was thick bodied, strong topped, super sound and an attractively made bull with a lot of style. I knew that this was the bull I would use on my premium replacement heifers. Now I usually don't buy insurance on my bulls as I never see the value in it but I knew this bull was pretty special so I indulged this one time. Of course, I never expected that I would need to use it.

As I went back to the yard to get the tractor, I started thinking about the insurance claim and made the call to the insurance company. I was quite upset and told them that I had just found my favourite bull dead in the pasture. I remember them asking me one question that stuck out: "Have you ever submitted a DNA sample for this bull?" I hadn't thought that this was something that they would ask for. I figured that they could just come out and identify the bull.

It turns out that they need solid proof that the bull that died is actually the bull that you have insured. The best proof is a DNA sample from the bull that matches a DNA sample that you have previously submitted to the lab.

Since I did not have this type of proof I had to jump through many hoops to try and prove that yes indeed this was the bull that I had insured. DNA testing the animal after it has died and verifying it to the parents helps some but it is not conclusive so the insurance company can deny the claim under the premise that there isn't enough proof.

What I have learned is that DNA testing is a valuable tool for many reasons. It is not just a resource to parent verify your calves, it is also a safety net for instances of death as well as theft. DNA can prove that the animal is the one that you say it is. I have now adopted the practice of pulling hair on all my bulls before they go to pasture so that I have proof of that animal's DNA if I should ever need it.



Word from the East

Autumn is upon us and it brings welcome relief across Ontario and most of Eastern Canada. The summer of 2016 has been wrought with challenges for beef producers with falling prices and severe drought in most parts of Southern Ontario. Many areas in Quebec and the Maritimes have also been severely impacted by the lack of moisture this year. Through August and September a little rain has fallen, and that has meant some saving grace for the pastures. Warm temperatures through September have also extended the grazing season. Hay is reportedly already selling at almost \$100 a round bale; it will be interesting to see how this affects the amount of animals sold and the prices through the fall.

September saw the first of the female production sales with a strong sale and a \$5,000+ average. Fall fair season is in full swing and there were also Gold Shows in each of the three regions. [Brome Fair \(QC\)](#) ran on September 2nd, [Brampton Fair](#) was September 18th and [Beef Expo Sussex](#) ran September 23rd - 25th. The Maritimes have now wrapped up all their 2016 Gold Shows; while Quebec has their second on October 8 at [Expo Boeuf, Victoriaville](#) and Ontario hosts the National Show in November at the [Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, Toronto](#).
